BARRIERS TO CBQA

- Not permitted under national legislation
- Permitted in theory but significant practical burdens for agencies and institutions
- Permitted only for certain types of HEIs or programmes
- Permitted but lack of transparent information on how outcomes are recognised

Important: voluntary additional EQA or EQA that replaces/contributes to national requirements

A COMPLEX STORY...

We have to...

- Facilitate accreditation of joint programmes, TNE etc
- Avoid duplication of external QA activities
- Allow HEIs to benefit from fit-for-purpose external QA
- Ease work of international QA agencies

And also...

- Recognise legitimate national level requirements
- Improve transparency
- Ensure consistent and professional work of agencies
- Reflect on consequences of marketisation

Engagement with all stakeholders regarding barriers and risks

 Action by national authorities to meet Bologna Process commitments and ensure transparency

 Promotion of ethical practice and guidelines (including the Key Considerations for Cross-border QA by E4+EQAR)
